
**J.B.H. WADIA** (1901-86), the founder of Wadia Movietone (established in 1933), was the direct descendant of the Master Shipbuilder Lowji Nusserwanji Wadia (1702-74) who had founded the Wadia Group in 1736.

Representing the family's main activity, a ship was incorporated into the family crest, as seen in the stained glass panels which decorated their home in Parel. The Wadia Movietone logo was inspired by the ancestral lineage as well, having a ship and eagle in its design.

Wadia Movietone's first studio was housed at the ancestral Lowji Castle but was later sold to the filmmaker V. Shantaram. This allowed J.B.H. Wadia to expand his studios on a vast plot of land acquired in Chembur. Several Wadia Movietone action movies featuring Fearless Nadia were shot amid the surrounding landscape.

J.B.H. Wadia's younger brother Homi Wadia eventually founded his own banner of Basant Studios there too, with both siblings working side by side well into the 1970s.

## Curator's Note


Wadia Movietone was established by J.B.H. Wadia in 1933, later joined by his brother Homi Wadia. It was one of the first studios in the 1930s to achieve success through the production of stunt films. Lal- E-Yaman was the first talkie film to be released under the banner of Wadia Movietone. Each Wadia Movietone film served a purpose and made a social statement. Be it the Fearless Nadia era that changed the portrayal of women in Indian cinema or Nav Jawan, the first Indian film without a single song. J.B.H. Wadia and Wadia Movietone constantly challenged conventional cinema in ways more than one.

Riyad Wadia (1967 – 2003), the grandson of J.B.H. and Hilla Wadia, was a film buff right from childhood, learning all he could about his grandfather's studio and work, along with the rich history of the Wadia family itself. Riyad eventually studied filmmaking at Charles Sturt University in Australia, before returning to Bombay to resurrect the Wadia Movietone banner with a groundbreaking documentary Fearless: The Hunterwali Story (1993) on the life and times of his great-aunt Fearless Nadia a.k.a. Mary Ann Evans.

Steeped in film history, Riyad lovingly collated the Wadia Movietone archives for future generations to draw upon, and in his private capacity collected and curated as many posters, booklets, and other Indian film memorabilia as he could – primarily pertaining to Wadia Movietone but also representing other studios - from purveyors in Lamington Road and other noted cinematic inventory spots across Bombay.

The Estate of Riyad Wadia has been consigned to Prinseps. A research-driven auction house, Prinseps prides itself in auctioning estates of notable creatives, thus creating narratives and building on India's rich history. Prinseps will be auctioning this estate, which includes film posters from India's most historical and legendary production house, Wadia Movietone and other prominent studios of that time. The posters include iconic films such as Diamond Queen, Miss Frontier Mail and Stunt Queen starring Fearless Nadia along with feature films like Captain Kishore, Mela, and Saaz aur Sanam. Blockbuster films such as Pukar, Sholay and Sangam too are featured in the auction. The Prinseps tribute to Wadia Movietone highlights items from the Riyad Wadia Collection, preserved by his mother and brother after his untimely death at the age of 36.




# J. B. H. WADIA AND WADIA MOVIETONE

Cinema came to India within a couple of years of its invention in the last decade of the 19th century. Dadasaheb Phalke, however, is considered the Father of Indian Cinema as he was the first filmmaker to have produced the very first full-length film in India that could be shown theatrically all on its own. This was in the year 1913. Overnight, it replaced live theatre with cinematic features. This was the beginning of the Indian film industry which soon became the second-largest in the world after Hollywood.

Before long, enthusiastic film pioneers made films in Bombay, Calcutta, and Madras for the rapidly expanding cinema audiences all over the country – from urban centres to second and third-tier cities and towns. Among the growing tribe of filmmakers and their film production companies, there was one unique company that began making films in 1928.



The man behind Wadia Movietone & his motivation

This was Wadia Movietone, started by an intellectually accomplished, politically conscious Parsi from an elite background ---Jamshed "J.B.H." Wadia, a descendant of the legendary Wadia shipbuilders, who was meant to pursue a career in law or finance with the approval of his conservative family, but who was enamoured of nay, obsessed with - the cinema from the very first moment he encountered it through the work of the

Lumiere Brothers. Turning his back on a more conventional path, J.B.H. Wadia embarked upon his chosen profession in 1928, when cinema was still silent, learning all he could about film in a relatively short time, at the hands of others who had embarked upon this new art just a few years before him.

"His early films, encompassing Arabian Nights and swashbuckling scenes, are a testament to the outsize influence Hollywood stunt films and actors had upon him – figures like Douglas Fairbanks and Pearl White."

In 1934, J.B.H.'s gamble in casting a white lady named Mary Ann Evans – with the screen name Nadia – in small roles initially and then as Hunterwali, the lady with the whip, in her fullfledged avatar as "Fearless" Nadia, proved a genuine pivotal moment in Indian cinema. Hunterwali was among the most successful films of its time, transforming Nadia – born in Australia but raised in British India - into one of the most highly paid actors of her time and spawning a genre of stunt actors who sought to emulate Nadia but never quite succeeded – she was in a class all her own. As the Indian independence movement grew and J.B.H. became more involved in it, he saw the stunt movie genre as an opportunity to move beyond entertainment for its own sake, to encompass "Education Through Entertainment", which became the studio's motto.

Nadia's films — with **Diamond Queen** (1940) the finest example,
perhaps - often conveyed multiple
social messages — the need for gender
equality, literacy for the masses,
ethnic and religious harmony, and
other essentials that an eventually
independent India would need to build
and prosper as a fledgling nation.





J.B.H.'s nationalist politics had brought him into close proximity with the leading members of the Indian National Congress such as Mahatma Gandhi, Jawaharlal Nehru, Rajendra Prasad, Sarojini Naidu, and other leading lights of the freedom movement.

J.B.H. Wadia meticulously documented on film political rallies and speeches of these great national leaders. Among these films is a documentary the he made on Haripura Congress session held in 1938. These films are an excellent historical record preserved on celluloid of landmark events of the freedom movement of the last two decades before India's independence.

While J.B.H. Wadia was a visionary, his brother Homi Wadia (younger to him by a decade) was a practical down-to-earth businessman who had joined the Wadia Movietone **Studios** and directed many of the early films feature that company produced, before eventually launching his banner of Basant Films. Homi had a decades-long relationship with, and eventually married, Nadia.





The reason they didn't get married until the early 1960s was the opposition of the wider Wadia family – although J.B.H. constantly encouraged his brother to throw convention to the winds and follow his heart, emulating the themes that the brothers and Nadia

personified in their films. Despite occasional artistic differences, the brothers worked closely together throughout their careers, helping each other out on their films, with their respective banners housed under the same physical studio lot at Chembur in Bombay.

### Revolutionary influences

J.B.H. Wadia had a wide range of interests and hosted several nationalist as well as international revolutionary figures of the period at his celebrated Bombay home of Casa da Vinci on Worli Sea Face — where he and his wife Hilla held gatherings featuring politicians, musicians, and poets. Among the friends and guests who enjoyed their hospitality was M.N. Roy, the founder of Radical Humanism, a prominent left-wing ideologue and former colleague of several of the political leaders who shaped the modern world, such as Emiliano Zapata who led the Mexican Revolution of 1916 and Vladimir Ilyich Lenin, the leader of the Russian revolution of 1917. As it happened, Roy had travelled with Lenin in the sealed train that took them from Switzerland to St. Petersburg in Russia. That single event is considered the beginning of the first successful communist revolution in the world -- the Bolshevik Revolution that led to the creation of the Soviet Union.

M.N. Roy eventually became disillusioned with Communism and the excesses carried out in its name under the regime of Stalin with whom he'd fallen out of favour – prompting Roy to eventually found Radical Humanism, which took the Humanist movement to a new level by espousing a radical cleansing of superstition, bigotry and other entrenched social ills that he saw as impending post independence India's chances of success as a genuine democracy.



M.N. Roy was not only a mentor but became one of the Wadias' closest friends; Roy and his German-Jewish wife Ellen Gottschalk Roy spent considerable time with Jamshed and his wife Hilla at Casa da Vinci. So close was the friendship, J.B.H.'s first grandson was named Roy after the revolutionary leader.


## The Wadia Movietone legacy

**J.B.H.** Wadia headed Wadia Movietone from its inception in 1933, through the heyday of talkies well into the 1970s, producing almost a hundred films before the shutters finally came down on the production of feature films by the company.


The company – both individually and in collaboration with the Wadia Brothers and Basant banners - produced a wide range of films in various genres; stunt films, historical and mythological epics, fantasies, melodramas, and musicals including films propagating radical social reforms in Indian society. This output included the first Indian film without songs (Nav Javan), the first Indian film produced in English, Hindi, and Bengali (The Court Dancer), the first Sindhi language film (Ekta), and numerous films with landmark special effects (including films as vastly different as Toofani Tarzan, Aladdin and the Wonderful Lamp, and Sampoorna Ramayana).

Over the decades, J.B.H. Wadia also spotted many a talented actor or actress at the very outset of their careers, nurturing them by offering them their first big breaks or other significant opportunities, including stars as varied as Feroz Khan (Reporter Raju), Mumtaz (Main Shaadi Karne Chala), Helen (Veer Rajputani) and Rekha (Saaz aur Sanam). He also signed on well-established stars, attracted by his films' socially conscious themes, including Dilip Kumar and Nargis (Mela) and Prithviraj Kapoor (The Court Dancer and Ankh ki Sharm).

The Renaissance Man who spoke and wrote in multiple languages from Hindi and Gujarati to Persian and Urdu was also deeply involved in the music and lyrics composed for his films – working closely with luminaries such as Naushad Ali and Shakeel Badayuni (Mela), Chitragupta and Kaifi Azmi (Saaz aur Sanam), and Bulo C. Rani (Veer Rajputani). For both its varied output and the persona and motivation of its founder J.B.H. Wadia, Wadia Movietone has a unique and prominent place in the history of Indian cinema. Even if it were known only for creating the Fearless Nadia/Hunterwali stunt genre, the studio would have a prominent place in the Bollywood pantheon.



# DECODING THE SIGNIFICANCE

## of posters, lobby cards and songbooks

A **film poster** is a visual depiction including a striking visual with the movie's title, cast, director, and release date. Some also feature quotes and catchy slogans from the film to further attract cinema-goers. Old posters like the ones up for auction are often collected and cherished by connoisseurs for their distinctive designs, historical value, vibrant colours, and larger-than-life typography. The hand painted poster of Miss Frontier Mail starring Fearless Nadia remains unique since its preservation from 1936 while also helping one revisit the lost art of poster making in India.

A **lobby card** is similar to a poster but smaller in size, once displayed in cinema lobbies to lure the audience into theatres. No longer made, these small posters elicited a graphic appeal in the sense that they comprised close-ups of the film's cast in action or depicted an important scene from the film. This gave the cinema-goers a flavour of the film later collected as mementos by some for years to come. Lobby cards were often black and white and sometimes also painted upon.

A **songbook** is a small brochure/booklet with song lyrics and a treasure trove of information about the film including storyline, cast, and credits. The aim was to lure cinema-goers into theatres. These are now preserved by connoisseurs as vintage film memorabilia. These song books also contained visuals of forthcoming films.

#### THE PLOT

Ishwarlal, the Deputy Station Master of a railway station is murdered by a masked man. In the ensuing scuffle the mask comes off and one of the henchmen happens to see the face. But they manage to escape. The Station Master Maganlal comes to the room and pries the knife from his Deputy's body. Just then the police arrive and arrest the Station Master.

Savita and Jayant are Maganlal's children. Savita is fond of hunting, tennis, and racing fast cars. Jayant is an amateur filmmaker. Both of them receive a telegram about the news that their father has been arrested. It is sent to them by their Uncle Shyamlal. Jayant and his friend soon get involved in the villain's actions when they manage to film him and his gang while they are planning to blow up a bridge. It is the masked man, who blows up the bridge. He has been engaged by a person who owns an airline company and wants to promote his business.

Savita and Jayant begin a hunt for the masked man, Sundar, the son of the head of the railway authority who is infatuated with Savita. Gulab, a gangster's mall, who is siding with the villain also turns around and joins Savita in her quest to eliminate the masked man.

Savita and Sundar stage a fight with the gangsters atop a train and succeed. Meanwhile, Signal X the villain, and his men manage to steal the box containing the film of the gangster's doings. When Savita lands up to fight them, Shyamlal pretends to help Savita but actually, he helps the hirelings to run away.

Fortunately, the film is replaced with bananas by Jayant's friend. But Shyamlal succeeds in burning the film. The henchmen surprise Sundar in the cabin where he is posted as the apprentice. He fights valiantly but in vain. The trains crash and he faces an inquiry. His father refuses to yield even for the sake of his son. Sundar escapes and goes to the lonely house where Savita has been held by Shyamlal alias Signal X. He tricks Savita and Sundar into a trap. In reality, he wants to kill them. Just then the police come in with Jayant and his friend. The culprits are rounded up. But Signal X manages to escape in an airplane.

#### THE PLOT

Set in the early 19th century Manipur, the film is the story of a romance of the King designate Chandrakirti and the dancer Indrani. Chandrakirti is to be crowned the King. He is spending time with his lady love. But his father frowns upon his choice. The father would like him to marry the Princess of the neighbouring Tripur.

The King would like the Prince to meet the visiting high Priest of Koshishwar. The Prince refuses to comply. Indrani performs the 'Raas Leela' for her Prince. The visiting Priest happens to come there and watch Indrani perform. He is fascinated by Indrani's depiction of Radha. He approaches her to apply the sacred dust. But the King is horrified and informs the Priest of her lowly status. The Priest recoils at the revelation.

Indrani is further humiliated when she tries to accompany Chandrakirti to the temple and is refused entry. On her way back from the Temple she passes another ruined temple where she is readily welcomed and her offerings accepted. Prince Chandrakirti, who has followed her promises her that when he becomes the King and marries her he will abolish all such customs. Naturally, the King is enraged and orders her to be executed. The High priest intervenes and requests a chance to talk to Indrani. He finds her and asks her to sacrifice her love for the sake of peace and harmony for the people of Manipur. The Chief Guard too is coveting Indrani. He threatens her that if she does not accept him he will instigate trouble against both of them.

What happens to the lovers is the crux of the film.







#### THE PLOT


Does he really die? How does it happen? How the wheels of fortune turn is the crux of the film.

Princess Padmavati is trained by Gurudeo in martial arts at his Ashram. She falls in love with Veersingh whom she saves from his evil brother Daku Zalimsingh. Zalimsingh is a war profiteer who pits the armies of Maharana Pratap and Akbar the Great by creating misunderstandings. Padmavati and Veersingh along with Rajkumari Surekha help solve the sticky situation. In dramatic events involving legendary characters like poet Prithviraj, the Rajputs realise that Zalimsingh has deceived them and prepare for the great battle of Panipat. The film climaxes as the mighty army led by Maharana Pratap go off to battle singing "Insaan Bano" (a tune that Nehru's Indian Army adopted during the 1962 Indo-Pakistan war)

Veer Rajputani is also noted for the first screen appearance of Helen as a dancer. J.B.H. Wadia's direction and use of actual locations were lauded by critics when the film was released.



## A UNIQUE HERITAGE OFFERING

From: The Riyad Wadia Collection

In the mid-1700s, the Master Shipbuilder Lowji Nusserwanji Wadia built a grand bungalow in tony Parel, which came to be known as Lowji Castle – with an imposing entrance hall and a wide oak- wood balustrade leading from it to the living area! Lighting up the entrance lobby were several colourful stained-glass panels with the family crest and motto – "Honor and Magnanimity" along with the sailing ship at the centre of the design! Several generations of the Wadia family lived in this palatial abode right up to the late 1800s. It is recounted by J.B.H. Wadia's family members that the elite of Bombay society wined and dined at the 'castle' including senior members of the British establishment.

In the early 1900s J.B.H. Wadia, a direct descendant of the family came to own Lowji Castle and established his company Wadia Movietone there adopting the Wadia leitmotif of the sailing ship in its company logo. By this time the building needed a lot of repairs and the stained–glass panels were removed during that time. We are indeed fortunate that J.B.H. and later Riyad Wadia took pains to preserve this heritage.




Lowji Nusserwanji Wadia, a noted shipbuilder, founded the Wadia Group in 1736. The Wadia family had already established themselves in Surat, an important sea port on the west coast of India. This was also where the British East India Company was first established. Already aware of Lowji's penchant for shipbuilding workmanship, The British East India Company secured the services of Lowji to build docks and ships in Bombay in 1736. Lowji Wadia, leading a team of ten carpenters, reached Bombay from Surat after a written request from the British Government in 1736. Lowji Wadia progressed the Wadia shipbuilding dynasty after accepting a contract from the British East India Company to build docks and ships in Bombay (now Mumbai). Lowji and his brother Sorabji built Asia's first dry-dock, the Bombay dry-dock in 1750.

Lowji Wadia transformed Bombay into one of the most prominent harbour towns in Asia. The city soon became a viable trading port for all ships from the West and East. And in gratitude to Lowji's contribution and achievements, he was awarded the title of Master Shipbuilder - and gifted several plots of land. Bomanjee Wadia - the grandfather of J.B.H. and Homi Wadia, was the last in the family to work as a master shipbuilder for the East India Company.

Lowji has fittingly been called the founder of the shipping industry in Bombay, passing away in 1774. His sons Maneckji and Bomanji built on and continued his legacy of integrity, industry and ability.

The Wadia family gained fame as one of the pioneers of the Indian shipbuilding industry. By the 1840s, the Wadias had built over a hundred warships for Britain with many trading networks worldwide. As per the book The Bombay Dockyard and the Wadia Master Builders, the ship HMS Trincomalee was built by Lowji's nephew - Jamshedji Bamanji Wadia, and launched on October 12, 1817, for the British Navy. Later the ship was renamed Foudroyant (1897). It served the British during the Crimean War (1852-1857) and World War II (1939-1945) and is now reposed in Hartlepool, Britain, currently preserved as a museum ship.

Seven generations of Wadia master-shipbuilders have built ships in Bombay. Several ships were constructed for the Indian and British Navy. When their association with the Bombay Dockyard came to an end in 1913, the Lowji Wadia family had left a bequest of over 400 ships, from barques to schooners, merchant vessels and man-o-wars, cutters and clippers, frigates, water boats to steamships!

Grandson of pioneer film producer J.B.H. Wadia, Riyad acknowledged that 'my grandfather was the greatest influence in my life; he taught me about cinema and fuelled my passion for it.' In his brief life of 36 years, Riyad managed to literally live the heritage of his grandfather J.B.H. Wadia.

After studying film craft at university in Australia, he set about recording the outstanding career of the Stunt Queen - 'Fearless Nadia.' The result was an award winning documentary - 'Fearless: The Hunterwali Story', exhibited in over 100 festivals worldwide.

Riyad became passionate about preserving the legacy of Wadia Movietone founded in 1933 and Basant Studios founded in 1942. He scoured the country collecting posters, lobby cards, song-books and other memorabilia. He held exhibitions in Bombay, New York and curated an exhibition in Zurich. He aimed to make the public realise the value of cinema poster art and to keep alive for postering the work of the film greats.






Stemming from his love for cinema and art, Riyad Wadia in addition to collating the creative legacy of Wadia Movietone, collected film memorabilia (posters and songbooks) of other prominent production houses during that time. This includes iconic Bollywood films comprising an eclectic collection of movies directed by Sohrab Modi - Pukar (1939), Sheesh Mahal (1950), Kundan(1955) and Farz aur Mohabbat (1957).

These films had star-studded casts including Nigar Sultana and Naseem Banu amongst others. The collection also features the film poster of Mirza Sahiban (1947), a cinematic adaptation of one of the four popular tragic romances of Punjab, while the evergreen dancing queen Helen starred in Jawani ki Hawa (1959). Colourful film posters of Manzil (1960) and Ek ke Baad Ek (1960) feature the ever popular Dev Anand, known for playing the lead actor for more than five decades in over 110 motion pictures.

Sangam features the greatest showman of Indian cinema Raj Kapoor and Vyjayanthimala, a versatile and influential performer during the "Golden Age" of Hindi cinema. Sholay (1975) is one of the highlights of this collection of posters featuring an array of stars such as Amitabh Bachchan, Dharmendra, Jaya Bhaduri and Hema Malini in pivotal roles, while Rekha and Jeetendra stand tall in the poster of Ek Hi Bhool (1981).
